

A MISSIONARY IN OUR COMMUNITY

MRS C. (84) SHARES HER STORY



Her name is Evelyn Ann Jessie Cartwright, but most of us simply know her as "Mrs C.". I am meeting with her in her flat at St Gregory's Court, a stone's throw away from St Aidan's Church. From her flat on the hill, she can see all the way to the river, but also keep an eye on everything that's happening in the court. Even though she doesn't often come to St Aidan's Church, she is known by a lot of people in the community.

She was born in 1930 in Guy's Hospital, London. Her older brother died when he was only six weeks old, so Evelyn grew up together with her younger sister. As far as she can remember, her dad was always ill. He eventually died when she was 11-years-old: "Of lung cancer, but they only found out it was cancer the weekend he died. It was an awful time." Evelyn shares how she was encouraged to give her dad a goodbye kiss after he died, but was shocked by how cold he was. She had to grow up overnight.

The war years are still vivid in her memory. Especially the meagre rations: two ounces of cheese, four ounces of margarine... Sometimes, Evelyn and her sister got a Saturday morning treat: a roll with butter on it. Evelyn tells me it is during the war that she learnt to pray. Even in school they used to pray for the war to end: "I was counting the days for when I would be old

enough to join the forces so I could help out myself. But the war ended when I was 15. We were so happy, we danced in the streets!"

When she was 17, Evelyn met her husband Maurice, a Gravesend based painter & decorator. After courting for six years they got married in 1954. Her husband came from Gravesend and lived in the area were she once thought she never wanted to live: Hampton Crescent: "I always said I wouldn't go there. It was a rough area and I came from the country. There used to be a bit of a barrier. But I believe God put me right in the middle of where I didn't want to go."

Beneath her modest appearance is the soul of a pioneer. Evelyn is one of the original members of one of the most vibrant churches in town: "We first started going to Chalk Pentecostal Church [now City Praise Centre] in 1956. In the beginning, we met at

"I BELIEVE GOD PUT ME RIGHT IN THE MIDDLE OF WHERE I DIDN'T WANT TO GO..." Chalk Village Hall. There were only about a dozen of us. I was one of the youngest. We were really searching for God. During one of our meetings, when I was still smoking, a lady gave me a word from God. She told me I had to stop smoking, it was very clear. So I stopped straight away. When you have really committed yourself to the Lord, He never leaves you and you never leave Him."

"I have always stayed loyal to my church, because I believe sometimes we are called to stop in a certain place and really commit ourselves. Over the years a lot has changed. Of course, change is difficult. But my response is always to pray. And read the Bible. I think anyone who struggles with change needs to seek the face of the Lord. God will speak to you if you are willing to listen."

"Because of my health, I can't always get involved with everything that happens in church. But I just go there and talk to people. The Bible says we should not despise the days of the small things. It is the small things that grow into big things. I have always prayed that God would give me a loving heart. I often think: what can I do today. I know I can't go far, but sometimes it might just be a knock on someone's door."

Mrs C. is quite candid when talking about her serious health issues: "Yes," she says, "I do have the big C, cancer. I try not to think about it. When it is my time





to go to the Lord, He will be there for me. I am not scared, because I know where I am going. There is no pain, praise God! I just don't sleep very well. Maybe I should read the Bible more when I lie awake at night. I also keep a notebook with people I pray for. Even though I am ill, I still have a busy schedule. I don't rest enough, is what the consultant tells me!"

I ask Mrs C. if there is anything she would like to say to the people of St Aidan's Church. Without hesitation she answers: "To pray, to read God's word and to give! Giving is one of the most important things in life. It is important to tithe your money [give 10% away]. We as older people should be an example to the younger ones, even in giving. It doesn't matter what you give to God, He will give you back more than you can imagine. God has looked after me in tremendous ways. Most of the things I have got in this room have been given to me by the people around me."

Even though Mrs C. never wanted to move to this part of Gravesend, she has been very happy here: "I have received so much love. My daughter told me: 'you wanted to be a missionary, and this community is the place where you have been a missionary.' I don't want to bump myself up or be big headed, that is something I have never wanted. But if God has been able to use me in this community, I am very grateful."

It is time to take some pictures, as Mrs C. will be the 'cover girl' of this issue of the magazine. "I better put a bit of lipstick on," is what Evelyn says. "I haven't got a clue what my hair looks like, but I did spend a couple of minutes on it this morning!"

As we say goodbye, I cannot help but feel inspired by this little woman with a big heart and faith!

As well as stalls selling toiletries, toys, books, bric-a-brac and cards, there was a lucky dip, name the teddy, a hamper raffle and a general raffle.

One of the highlights of the fair this year was a raffle to win a ride in the crane which brought Father Christmas. The winner passed their prize to Lusa who was one of the few people brave enough to go to such a height! The use of the crane was kindly donated by Daniel Brignail. The fair raised a total of £465 for church funds.





RE-OPENING OF CAFE!

The Friday Community Café that closed in the autumn will soon be reopening its doors.

Chris M'Boge, former chair of the Westcourt Residents Association (WRA), believes that the café is a vital institution for a number of members of the community who are isolated: "I have been involved with the café for the past two years and have seen how important those three hours every Friday morning were for many folks in the community. We



have even welcomed visitors from Germany. The café really deserves a new lease of life."

The café was originally run by volunteers from the WRA. However, since the committee became defunct at the end of October 2014, the café was unable to continue. St Aidan's PCC felt compelled to keep this vital service to the community going. A dedicated team has been busy planning the revamped version of the Community Café.

In reopening the café, the PCC is hoping that it will be a place for all in the community to come and meet others and build new relationships. The Reverend Lusa Nsenga-Ngoy, Vicar of St Aidan's, says "It's a community café so we want to see everyone involved, especially young people. We are willing to offer volunteering experience and training. We want to make it into a safe place for all to come and find a nice atmosphere."

The official launch will be held after Easter in presence of the Mayor and Mayoress of Gravesham and our local councillors. (date to be confirmed)

Dear Lusa,

Dear Lusa, my name is Ola. I've been pondering for a long time about the Easter story, especially the cross. Could you tell me: why did Jesus have to die?

Dear Olu.

Why did Jesus have to die? All theology students, in the course of their studies, come across this question. As a matter of fact, hundreds of books have been written on the topic. Even today, Christian theologians wrestle with how best to answer this question. Many of our attempts to solve it will naturally reflect the diversity and complexity of the question.

The starting point is the Christian understanding that our world, created perfect, became imperfect through sin. The Bible is a retelling of that story with an emphasis on God's effort to redeem the whole of creation. For Christians it is through Jesus's death that the world's broken relationship with God is restored. This is known as the Atonement, from atone-ment, being 'at one', reconciled, in harmony with someone. There are various theories of atonement, each attempting to give a specific angle to the story of salvation.

At the heart of that story of reconciliation, Christians have set the cross as a key symbol of the atonement. Christian's fascination with the cross is not an indication of their taste for gore and blood, nor is it their endorsement of violence. Instead, the cross, a Roman instrument of torture and execution, says something about humanity, its penchant for violence and brutality, and its ability to strip others of all dignity and purpose. The cross is a symptom of everything that is wrong with a broken world. In dying on that cross, Jesus aims to take on once and for all the forces of evil and decay.

By choosing the cross, God protests against the worst of humanity, and at the same time, stands in solidarity with the brokenness of that same humanity; an echo of the nativity story, Emmanuel, God with us. In the end though, Jesus triumphs over those forces and exposes their limits. To me, the cross can only be fully understood in light of the resurrection. It is a way of saying that the forces of destruction and division should not and do not have the final word.

As we reflect on Jesus' death, it is easy to loose sight of the fact that the story of Jesus is as much about his death and resurrection as it is about his life. If Jesus' death is important, so too is his life. It is through the living Jesus that we're given an insight of a different way of being human.

The atonement is a key concept in Christianity. Sadly, Christians have often opposed each other according to where they stood on the debate. That is a contradiction because atonement theories are about reconciliation, being at one, in harmony. Ultimately, what matters, is perhaps not so much how watertight the argument is, but how it helps us to be reconciled with self, the other, and God.

My prayer is that as we each face aspects of our broken world, unemployment, poverty, broken relationships, illness, etc., we may also experience something of that spirit of reconciliation and find ways to fully reconnect with the world as it should be.
